

The Role of the Corridor Access Switch

An access switch in a corridor allows users to control lighting from multiple points, enhancing convenience, safety, and energy efficiency.

Primary Function

The access switch in a corridor is designed to control one or more lights from two or more locations. In long corridors, stairwells, or large rooms, it allows a person to turn lights on when entering and off when leaving, without needing to walk back to the original switch location. This is typically achieved using two-way (SPDT) switches for two control points or intermediate switches when three or more control points are needed.

Energy Efficiency and Safety

Modern corridor systems often integrate motion sensors or dimmable ballasts. For example, the corridorFUNCTION system raises light levels to 100% when a control signal is applied and dims them automatically when the area is unoccupied, providing energy savings while maintaining safety. This ensures that corridors remain illuminated for safety but reduces unnecessary energy consumption when the space is empty.
